

Get to know the Title IV-E Prevention Services Clearinghouse

The Title IV-E Prevention Services Clearinghouse was established by the Administration for Children and Families within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

The Clearinghouse conducts objective and transparent research reviews on programs and services intended to provide enhanced support to children and families and prevent foster care placements.

The Clearinghouse aims to be a useful source of information on evidence-based programs and services that may be eligible for funding under Title IV-E of the Social Security Act as amended by the Family First Prevention Services Act.

How are programs and services rated in the Clearinghouse?

The Clearinghouse uses unique standards and procedures to conduct an objective and transparent systematic review of research on programs and services intended to provide enhanced support to children and families and prevent foster care placements. These standards and procedures were developed to align with the guiding legislation and, as a result, Prevention Services Clearinghouse ratings may differ from those of other clearinghouses.

Trained reviewers use a systematic process following consistent, transparent standards and procedures to rate programs and services as well-supported, supported, promising, or does not currently meet criteria.

The typical reviewer has an advanced degree and has experience working on multiple systematic evidence review projects. All reviewers have completed training on Prevention Services Clearinghouse evidence standards.

The Clearinghouse's systematic process is informed by feedback from the public; gathered through a variety of sources, including conversations with experts, responses to Federal Register Notices, and emails sent to the Clearinghouse Inbox.

First, programs and services are identified for review.

State or local government administrators and tribes, federal partners, program developers, researchers, and other members of the public nominate programs for the Clearinghouse to review and the Clearinghouse selects and prioritizes programs and services for review.

The Clearinghouse conducts a literature search to locate research studies on the effectiveness of the prioritized programs and services.

The Clearinghouse conducts an evidence review to rate the strength of evidence of the studies using the design and execution standards. [The graphic lists the study evidence ratings as: high, moderate, or low.]

Then the Clearinghouse characterizes study findings by assessing the direction, magnitude, and statistical significance of impact estimates. Findings are characterized as favorable, no effect, or unfavorable.

Then finally, the Clearinghouse rates programs and services as well-supported, supported, promising, or does not currently meet criteria based on the available evidence from the studies that meet design and execution standards.

The Clearinghouse integrates active engagement into every step of the systematic review process, conducting a wide range of active engagement activities to promote transparency, gather input on Clearinghouse standards and procedures, and collect information about programs and services.

How can I search for programs or services that have been reviewed?

Navigate to the searchable database from the Clearinghouse homepage.

You can search for a program or service by name.

This returns a list of programs with Familias in the name. The cursor scrolls down the list and selects the Familias Unidas button. The webpage navigates to display the Familias Unidas program page.]

Or you can search for a program or service by rating. You can select one or more boxes: Well-Supported, Supported, Promising, or Does Not Currently Meet Criteria.

Then the cursor clicks the Well-Supported and Supported selection boxes in the Program or Service Rating section of the search box. The cursor then clicks the Search button. This navigates the web display to a search results page showing programs tagged as Well-Supported or Supported.]

Alternatively, you can search for a program or service by program or service area.

[In the Search box, the cursor clicks the Clear Form button, then selects Mental Health in the Program or Service Area.]

Select from Mental Health, Substance Abuse, In-Home Parent Skill-Based, or Kinship Navigator.

[The cursor clicks the Search button which returns results of programs or services tagged with Mental Health.]

What information is available about programs and services?

You can read an overview of the program or service, and find more detailed information about evidence, findings, and studies reviewed.

The program page includes the program or service area and the rating, followed by the overview and sources consulted.

This is followed by the Target Population section, which describes who the program or service is designed to serve.

The Program or Service Delivery and Implementation section includes information about dosage; location or delivery setting; education, certifications and training; and program or service documentation.

The Extent of Evidence section shows the results of search and review.

The Summary of Findings section shows outcomes, effect sizes, number of studies and participants, and summarizes the findings from studies that were rated high or moderate on the design and execution standards.

The Individual Study Findings section provides this information by study reviewed.

The Study Participant Characteristics section contains information about study settings, and participant characteristics for studies rated moderate or high on design and execution.

Finally, the Studies Reviewed section provides citations for individual studies. For those studies not eligible for review, it also provides information about the reasons why they did not contribute to the overall program or service rating.

What are the next programs and services planned for review?
